VISION

 High-quality education that is inclusive and equitable for individuals with disabilities.

MISSION

- Cultivating, supporting, and empowering education professionals who work with individuals with disabilities by:
 - Advocating for education professionals and for individuals with disabilities, and/or gifts and talents
 - Advancing professional practice and scholarly research Promoting diversity, equity, inclusivity, and accessibility Building networks, partnerships, and communities

CEC Policy Agenda, 118th Congress

- Protecting and supporting IDEA
- Protecting and expanding policies outside IDEA that support students with disabilities and/or gifts and talents
- Strengthening the professions that provide the specialized interventions, education, and services to infants, toddlers, children and youth with disabilities and/or gifts and talents
- Advocating for ample funding for IDEA and other relevant programs
- Advocating for policies that promote safe, inclusive, and supportive schools

HELP Committee Priorities

Chairman Bernie Sanders (I-VT)

- Workforce compensation
- Youth mental health

Ranking Member Cassidy (R-LA):

- Literacy
- Artificial Intelligence
- Youth Mental Health

Senate has a 60 vote threshold for approval of legislation

Joint philosophy: work together whenever possible

HELP Committee Recent Action

Advancing Research in Education Act

- Reauthorization of the Education Sciences Reform Act
- Adds special education to mission statement of IES
- Re-envisions What Works Clearinghouse as a resource center for educators
- Supports engagement and collaboration between researchers, students, families, practitioners, education system leaders, and policymakers throughout research to practice
- Requires IES products to be high-quality, easily accessible, actionable, and timely

House Education and the Workforce Committee

Chair Virginia Foxx (R-NC)

- Parents Bill of Rights
- School Choice

Ranking Member Scott (D-VA)

- School climate
- Educational opportunity for all students (equity)

Bills pass by a simple majority.

Committee is typically partisan, hearings are polarized

Education/Workforce Recent Action

- Reauthorization of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act
 - Comprehensive, bipartisan product
 - Does not address Title IV, Rehabilitation Act
 - Bipartisan Workforce Pell Act
 - Extend Pell eligibility to certain short-term workforce programs

*Committee has advanced many partisan products that will not be considered in the Senate

Budget and Appropriations-Key Terms

Federal Fiscal Year: 12-month accounting period Oct. 1-Sep. 30

President's Budget: Annual spending recommendation for federal programs

Appropriation: Discretionary money directed at a federal program (Congress's "power of the purse")

Continuing Resolution: Extension of current funding levels for a specific amount of time

Appropriations Committees: House and Senate panels that craft spending bills

Appropriations Subcommittee: Subset of Committee that focuses on topical areas, i.e. Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies Subcommittee (Labor-H)



Authorization vs. Appropriation

Legal authority	Funding authority
Create or update (reauthorization) programs	Fund the programs established through authorization bills
Spending levels optional, non-binding	Spending levels determined each fiscal year
Example: Individuals with Disabilities Education Act	Funding varies from year to year

Example: IDEA Grants to States

Authorization

The maximum amount of the grant a State may receive under this section—
(i) the number of children with disabilities in the State who are receiving special education and related services—

(II) aged 6 to 21; multiplied by (ii) 40 percent of the average per-pupil expenditure in public elementary schools and secondary schools in the United States;

Appropriation FY

\$14.2* billion for Part B Grants to States an increase of \$20 million above the fiscal year 2023 enacted level

*The U.S. Department of Education estimates that for FY 2024, federal appropriations make up 10.7% of APPE



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Recent Congressional Action

Fiscal Responsibility Act (June, 2023)

- Suspends debt limit until January 2025
- Freezes Federal discretionary spending for Fiscal Year (FY) 2024
- Allows for a 1% increase for FY 2025


